Downturn in Bookstore Sales

Reports of softness at bookstores in September were confirmed by figures released this morning by the U.S. Census Bureau that showed that bookstore sales fell 4.5% in the month, to \$1.49 billion. Bookstore sales for the first nine months of the year, helped by sales at college bookstores, were up 1.8%, to \$12.53 billion.

The release of the September figures came just as the Commerce Department was announcing preliminary October sales for the entire retail segment. Those numbers showed sales falling by 2.8%, the largest decline ever recorded. (Commerce Dept. measures sales in constant dollars, adjusted for inflation; *PW* reports sales in real dollars). The deepest decline came in auto sales, but even excluding car sales, retail sales were down 2.2% for the month. Sales at bookstores, sporting goods stores and hobby stores fell a total of 1.6% in the month on an adjusted basis.

KATHY BORICH

December 2008 Spotlight Author

With the winter holiday season in full swing, our thoughts automatically turn to food. Whether it's an amazingly bountiful Thanksgiving dinner, the candy canes and sugar plums of Christmas, the exotic entrees of Kwanzaa, or the traditional Hanukkah feast of beef brisket, potato latkes, homemade applesauce and jelly doughnuts, food, fun, and friendship dominate the last two months of the year. What better time to spotlight our chapter's own **Kathy Borich**, author of *Appetite for Murder, A Mystery Lover's Cookbook* that combines menus and recipes for sumptuous feasts inspired by literature's most famous detectives, from Sherlock Holmes to Tony Hillerman. Most of us will never bring our personal Moriarty's to justice, but with *Appetite for Murder* we have a chance to celebrate daring and do in much the same way as our investigative heroes. Kathy is a gifted teacher, author, film critic, and domestic chef, who definitely knows the meaning of *Bon Appétit!*

MM: *Between your cookbook, and your Different Drummer.cc site, you seem to have an endless supply of recipes at your fingertips for fabulous dishes. Were you a chef in a former life as well as an English teacher.*

KB: I owe my love of cooking to my Italian/French grandmother, who helped raise me among the powdered lace of drying pasta, the warm earth of a back yard tomato garden, and the pungent sweetness of *giambotte*, her savory stovetop stew of weekly leftovers.

In the crowded kitchen, ensconced in the yeasty aroma of fresh bread, my mother and her sisters argued about the merits of basil versus oregano with the same passion some people reserved for politics. They judged their gravies, sauces, and the quality of the fresh herbs they chopped and diced with a sort of sibling jealousy usually saved for potential beaux.

MM: *It's the time of year when we're all looking for the perfect gift, and what could be better (or more fun) than a gastronomic trip down memory lane with everyone's favorite detectives and mystery authors. Will you share with us your inspiration for creating an Appetite for Murder, A Mystery Lover's Cookbook.*

KB: During my twenty-two years as an English teacher, I lured reluctant readers to the joys of literature by spicing up the dry pages with authentic cuisine. We discovered Voltaire along with handmade crepes whipped up in predawn darkness and nibbled our way through *Jane Eyre* with Victorian teas featuring oven-fresh scones and jam tarts.



This classroom juggling of tarts and tests, quizzes and cuisine, led to my giving seminars on the subject, including *The Literary and Historical Use of Herbs* presented to the International Medieval Institute. Then through a National Endowment for the Humanities Grant in World Literature, I spent a year researching medieval cooking by reading the material in its original Middle English.


My interest in the connection between cooking and crime began with an affinity for classic detective fiction. I relished the austere Sherlock Holmes and also became enamored with that trio of great dames, Agatha Christie, Margery Allingham, and Dorothy L. Sayers.

For some reason whenever I finished a Miss Marple tale, I felt a sudden urge to cook up a "good pot of tea." And I always wondered what treacle tart and seed cake would taste like. Lord Peter Wimsey introduced me to the magnificence of fine port and Albert Campion to the majesty of High Tea. I even enjoyed slumming with Horace Rumpole as he drank the cheap red wine he fondly called Pommeroy's plonk.

All these strange longings led to a work of love that found me thumbing through my favorites tales not for the crimes but for the crumpets. And I must admit that my favorite, Sherlock Holmes, with his ascetic ways, was not an easy mark. One only had to look at his skeletal frame to know that neither clotted cream nor fish and chips were on his menu.

MM: *Appetite for Murder, A Mystery Lover's Cookbook* has a cover that makes those of us sweltering in the Texas heat long for foggy afternoons spent in front of a roaring fire, the aroma of a roast slowly baking in the oven, and with the sound of hoof beats and Hansom cabs clacking against the cobbled lane outside our flats. Did you design the cover, or at least have input because it's so perfect?



KB: This is actually an interesting story. The cover is from a photograph of my daughter's living room. I had already noticed that her leather chair looked distinctly English, so one day when I was babysitting there, I rearranged all her furniture and took several shots. Most of the rest of the photographs in the

book were taken by my husband, a few at local pubs, some from a trip to Germany, and even one from an antique showroom. The geese on page 16 that accompany a Sherlock Holmes story about a jewel hidden in "the crop of a most unimpeachable Christmas goose" haunt the Joe's Crabshack on Riverside Drive. We really had to work to keep the Austin skyline out of the picture.

The photograph on the back cover is from my own garden.

MM: *You assembled a marvelous group of culinary experts to help with menus and recipes. What challenges and pleasant surprises did you encounter while doing that? I imagine a chef or two gulped when you linked mouth-watering entrees to murder.*

KB: My best experience was with Chef Roger Mollet, who was the executive chef at the Central Market cooking school when I was writing the book. I went to a cooking class featuring a healthy hunter's supper, hoping to use it for a Holmes story. When I asked his permission, he became intrigued enough with the idea to ask me to do a "Dinner to Die For" cooking class myself. Fortunately, he and his staff did all the cooking, and I only had to talk.

MM: *As every published author knows, the challenges of finding the right publisher can be daunting. With celebrity chefs publishing multiple books each year, the market for food-related publications must be very tight. Can you share some of the things you faced in bringing Appetite for Murder, A Mystery Lover's Cookbook to publication.*

KB: After looking for an agent and then approaching many, many publishers myself, I settled for a print-on-demand publisher who I had checked out through the Writers' League of Texas. Unless you are really well known and appear on television or radio, most agents or publishers are not ready to take a chance on you. Unfortunately, I think the field has gotten even more difficult recently.

MM: *Julia Childs was probably the first chef to engage mainstream audiences. Now we're bombarded by personalities on both cable and network channels. Have you seen an increase in sales for Appetite for Murder, A Mystery Lover's Cookbook as the Food Network's popularity grows?*

KB: I can't really answer that question fairly, since I have no statistics. I think quite a few people like to watch or read about cooking now, but quite frankly, I think fewer and fewer actually cook! Even on my website, I assume most readers will enjoy reading the recipes if not actually preparing them.

MM: *Have you found culinary-related or other unique venues for marketing Appetite for Murder that you'd like to share with us.*

KB: During the holiday season of 2004 I was really creative. I did a book signing at the Dog and Duck Pub in Austin and even rented a horse and carriage to give rides. I also did a signing at a Mystery Dinner and an organic farmer's market. I even lugged all sorts of items to these places to create a setting for my table. Although I did sell some fifty books or so, the process is really tiring. I think I sell just as many books through my movie review website and it is so much less physical.

MM: *Tell us about Different Drummer.cc, and how you decided to do movie reviews combined with recipes.*

KB: On a more personal note: I've always loved going to movies, and just as with my reading I often left the theater with a craving for the food shown in a film. Who could leave The Godfather without wanting to cook up some pasta? It's actually surprising, how easy it is to find food in most films.

Texas Mystery Month

The purpose of Texas Mystery Month, held each May, is to spotlight Texas Mystery Authors. As a community service event, all Texas Mystery Authors are invited to participate, and do not have to be members of Sisters in Crime.





Rise of the Cajun Mariners carries the reader into the unique, previously unexplored realm of the old wild and wooly oilfield boat business. This international industry was born in Louisiana's bayou country and pioneered by Cajuns.

The book follows four of these French-speaking trailblazers as they scrape to buy and build their first boats and struggle toward success, but this is about more than an inspirational pursuit of the American dream. It's a candid account of a colorful time in a vital business.

The story evolves from the awkward launch of the inland marine oilfield in the late 1930s and early 1940s, through the alternating boom and doom years of the 1950s and 1960s, up into the roaring 1970s, down into the 1980s' bust and back up toward a more realistic present.



As the boatmen race against the competition and time, many of them take a global journey. In the 1960s, Nolty Theriot helps bring the oilfield to the virgin, turbulent waters of the North Sea, setting the stage for an unforgettable culture clash between the Cajuns and the Europeans. In the 1970s, Bobby Orgeron sails his supply boats into Central America and discovers a land full of rich tropical opportunity and zany banana backwardness. As Bobby, Nolty, and the others navigate from Nicaragua to Norway, from Colombia to California, and from Africa to the Arctic Circle, they spread their Cajun ingenuity across the globe.

But before the Cajuns carry the oilfield into the Persian Gulf and the East China Sea, they launch their careers on Bayou Lafourche, where the book begins in the late 1930s.

In sum, Rise of the Cajun Mariners is a fast-paced tale about the rapid evolution of a worldwide industry, the modernization of a culture and the deliverance of four fascinating families.





And since I love foreign films, if there is not actually a dish in the movie, I just find a specialty of that country. (There's a more detailed explanation on the Different Drummer website in the "About Kathy" section.)

The best part is that the website is a perfect marketing tool. I don't ever feel embarrassed promoting it, as it is totally free, unlike trying to get someone to buy your book. I thoroughly recommend a service type website as a marketing device. Finally, for anyone who has experienced the disappointments and delays of getting a book published, there is the thrill of writing a review and then clicking an icon that says publish with your words immediately available to the public.

MM: *Are you still teaching? Working on a new cookbook? Or devoting your time to Different Drummer.cc?*

KB: I have been out of the classroom for a little over ten years. Though I have considered writing another book and even have a half finished mystery manuscript, I have so thoroughly enjoyed the pace of my life with the website, that I think I will concentrate on that for now.

MM: *Are you a native Texans? If not, where are you from and how did you arrive in the Lone Star state?*

KB: Our two children, both married, live here. I am so proud of them. One is a lawyer and the other a doctor. Between them, I have five grandchildren, four boys and a girl. They range in age from four months to five years. I spend one day a week babysitting for them, and recently, we've started having the two oldest over for an overnight once a month. I guess we are even very brave or foolhardy.

MM: *Do you have any pets?*

KB: Our dog, Zivjeli, is the third Weimaraner we have had, and he is quite a character. (His crazy name sounds kind of like Chevrolet and is from a Croatian drinking toast. We learned it when we visited the small town in Croatia where my father-in-law was born.) Like most Weimaraners, he is full of energy and if I don't take him for his two-mile walk daily, he looks for trouble here at home. During his first year, we sacrificed the remote control, our remote control, our computer travel

drive, at least two teapots, an entire salad, and several pairs of shoes to him. Now he contents himself with bringing these objects to us. Z-Man, as he is sometimes called, is especially fond of the grandchildren's books and brings me a few each morning while I sit at the computer.

MM: *When you're reading for pleasure, what do you prefer?*

KB: I still love mysteries, especially the older ones of Agatha Christie, Dorothy Sayers, and Sherlock Holmes. Some of the newer ones are a little too violent or cynical for me, but I do like Martha Grimes.

MM: *What is your favorite classic novel? And what book have you read recently that you've enjoyed the most?*

KB: That's a hard question for an English teacher, but I guess I will settle for Somerset Maugham's *Of Human Bondage*. The idea that we will always have one lost love who we know is really not worthy helped me during my late adolescence.

Recently, I read *The Woman in White* by Wilkie Collins, which I think is regarded as one of the first mystery novels. I believe one of Martha Grimes' novels referred to it, and I found an old copy among a library of classics I inherited from my parents.

MM: *You're obviously a huge movie fan? Who are some of your favorite actors/actresses both new and from the past, and why?*

KB: I really admired Rod Steiger, since he could actually become the person he portrayed on screen. I think, similarly, Robert Duval and Viggo Mortensen disappear into their roles, as does Christian Bale sometimes. Though I loved both Jimmy Stewart and Paul Newman, they essentially played themselves or variations of themselves throughout their careers. Phillip Seymour Hoffman is good, too, though I often feel the films he is in are too nihilistic for me.

Alan Arkin, Nicol Williams, and Vanessa Redgrave are also favorites. I loved all three, along with Robert Duval, in *The Seven Percent Solution*, a Freudian interpretation of Sherlock Holmes.

MM: *What is your all-time favorite movie?*

KB: I guess I would have to go with *The Third Man* with Orson Wells and Joseph Cotton. I think it is much better than *Citizen Kane*, which gets all the attention. Love, intrigue, treachery, and betrayal

Some of my favorite films are set in this era, such as *Army of Shadows*, a French film. The tremendous *The Lives of Others*, a German film about the misery of East Germany is also close to being a perfect film.

KB: I love to garden, especially herbs. I use them in cooking, but I also love the medieval lore that surrounds them. I also love to travel and have been lucky enough to go with my husband when he has taught out of the country. We have been to Germany, Switzerland, Mexico, South America, Hungary, Yugoslavia, Singapore, and China. Getting to know the people in these countries, to see their kindness and friendliness, even when their politicians might not be on good terms with America, has always been such a pleasure.

MM: *What is your favorite guilty pleasure?*

KB: Sometimes, I love to abandon the whole day to a good mystery, even forgoing my workout at the gym and a few times, my walk with Zivjeli. And when I am especially decadent, I have a bag of Cheetos and some dark chocolate at my side.

MM: *What is your favorite dessert?*

KB: I love cheesecake of any kind, and pies, too. My mother always made a delicious cherry pie with flakey crust and tart cherries. I've come to love Drunken Strawberries, too. They are soaked in wine and served with a sour cream/whipped cream combination that's supposed to be like the French Crème Fraîche.
