Joyce Arquette November 2008 Spotlight Author

We all know Joyce from her regular attendance at HoTxSinC meetings, and her e-mail messages sent throughout the month to keep us abreast of important events geared to mystery and true crime fans.

We also know Joyce for her quick wit and wry sense of humor, but now you'll get to know the "real" Joyce, straight from the source--Joyce! Sit back, relax and enjoy this one-on-one visit with HoTxSinC's own Publicity Chair Joyce Arquette!

MM: *Joyce, we all know you as the HoTxSinC's Publicity Chair. Did you accept the position because of a background in PR? If so, would I you like to share some of the special moments in your career.*

JA: I know absolutely nothing about PR. Whoever gave me the assignment (think it was Sarah Ann) must have been desperate. I think I just volunteered to do something to help.

MM: *How long have you been a member of Sisters In Crime? and the Heart of Texas Chapter?*

JA: Probably six or seven years or eight years. I started when we met at the LCRA building. Somebody told me about it, and I just started going.

MM: *Many of us are mystery fans first and writers second, or vice versa. Where do you fit into the mix?*

JA: I have written a mystery but do not intend to do another one. When I was working, I had a list of things I would do when I retired. Writing a mystery, with Kerrville as the focus place, was one of my goals. And now I've done it.

MM: *Would you like to tell us about any writing projects you're involved in?*

JA: I'm writing another book titled "A Handbook for Social Workers and Other Do-Gooders". It's actual stories that I, and former coworkers who are recounting stories for me, remember from the social work days. Some are funny; some are sad. All are unique.

MM: *Are you published?*

JA: No. I haven't really worked at it.

MM: *I discovered while browsing the Net, that there's a darling little fellow named Stevie who holds a very special place in your heart. Would you like to share how you found each other, and how your relationship is growing?*

JA: I had a Shar-Pei that died, and my kids in New Mexico, found Stevie for me at the Shar-Pei Rescue. He had been neglected and abused. He is now healthy and spoiled.

MM: *How many pets do you have? Do you all live in relative harmony?*

JA: I have the Shar-Pei and a 95-pound yellow Lab named Bonnie that I've raised from a puppy. We sleep together at night and walk together every morning. And I watch the Dog Whisperer so I'll know what to do with

Fireside Reviews

The Slippery Art of Book Reviewing By Myra Calvani & Anne K. Edwards

Ever wonder why books you found lacking received great reviews? Knew that you could write a better one? Ever thought about doing book reviews for fun and profit? Then this is the book for you.

Myra Calvani and Anne K. Edwards certainly produced a much-needed reference book that covers all aspects of becoming a book reviewer. Their concise narrative covers areas such as defining a book review and explaining the difference between it and a book report and press release; the don'ts; tips; ownership; as well as many other pertinent concerns. They also include resources and how libraries, book clubs, booksellers, etc. are influenced by reviewers.

As an owner of a book review service I was very interested what other reviewers had to say about the industry and what advice they give potential reviewers. Calvani is an author as well as a freelance reviewer and I'm sure much of the information came from her own experience although throughout the book there are excerpts of advice from other known online reviewers. The authors of "The Slippery Art of Book Reviewing" are very much to the point and it doesn't look like they missed anything.

Although this book is targeting potential reviewers, I encourage authors looking for reviews to peruse the book. The information about reviews, specifically if it's a negative review is enlightening. As well, there is an appendix with a list of online reviewers. Although the list is somewhat dated, it is a very thorough list. And, I don't mean dated in a negative way but I encourage the authors to also research the net for new services that recently emerged or reviewers that didn't make the list.

I do recommend "The Slippery Art of Book Reviewing" as a must-have resource guide. Calvani and Edwards present a well-written gold-mine to potential reviewers as well as a source of information for experienced reviewers and authors.


